The North Carolina Davidson County Sheriff Election

Amendment will appear on the November 2, 2010 ballot in the state of North Carolina as a legislatively-referred constitutional amendment. The proposed constitutional change, also known as Senate Bill 351, would alter the state constitution to prohibit convicted felons from running for sheriff in the state.^[1]

The measure was introduced by Senator Stan Bingham during the week of May 17, 2010, in light of the Davidson County sheriff race where candidate Gerald Hege is a convicted felon. Hege was running for the

position five years after pleading guilty to obstruction of justice charges. His bid for the position failed.^[2]

According to Bingham, "I was actually called by four different sheriffs in four counties who had concerns about this because of the working relationship they had in the past." Hege stated, "It's a great expense to do all of this to stop one man from running for sheriff-to protect your neighbor and friend."

Text of measure

Ballot title

The ballot language that voters will see on their ballot reads:

"[] FOR [] AGAINST

Constitutional amendment providing that no person convicted of a felony may serve as sheriff."^[3]

Summary


The summary of the measure reads:

An Act to amend the Constitution of North Carolina to provide that no person convicted of a felony is eligible to be elected sheriff.^[3]

If enacted by voters, the measure would change Article VII, Section 2 of the North Carolina Constitution.

Support

Supporters

Alamance County Sheriff Terry Johnson is in support of the measure. According to a press release by the county's sheriff's department, "Sheriff Johnson indicated that he felt it was unacceptable to have felons serving as the head law enforcement official in any county of North Carolina."^[4]

The North Carolina Sheriffs' Association voted on March 17, 2010 to back the measure. According to the group's press release, "The North Carolina Sheriffs' Association does not want something as crucial and fundamental to professional law enforcement as the public trust to be placed in the hands of a known felon, having been found to be such in a court of law."^[5]

Executive vice president of the Sheriffs' Association stated that there were four convicted felons that bid to run for the office this year in the state, and that fact should lead to big support for the measure.^[2]

According to reports, Gerald Hege stated that the measure being proposed isn't about the issue, but more about politics.^[1]

Support

- The Dispatch, the newspaper for Davidson County, wrote an article in favor of the measure. The publication wrote, "State Sen. Stan Bingham, R-Davidson, has been a driving force behind the effort to bar felons from running for sheriff. He's received support from the North Carolina Sheriffs Association. The initial House vote was 112-0 in favor of the bill. Those two facts should sway any voters who have questions about the wisdom of the amendment."^[6]
- The Winston Salem Journal published an editorial on July 10, 2010, calling for support of the amendment. The publication wrote that there are a number of ways that a felon can win an election, whether by default or other ways: "It is also entirely possible that someone's criminal background could go undetected until it was too late. With it emblazoned in the constitution that such a person cannot be sheriff, the odds of it happening become much smaller. When voters go to the polls in November, they will very likely pass this amendment overwhelmingly. It simply makes too much

sense, and we wonder why it wasn't part of the constitution already."^[7]

Path to the ballot

The measure was approved by the North Carolina Senate on June 23, 2010 by a vote of 46-1. The bill was then sent to the North Carolina House of Representatives for a vote where it was approved unanimously. The last step for the measure to make the ballot is for the House to approve ballot language. Section 4 of Article XIII of the North Carolina Constitution says that a legislatively-referred amendment can go on the ballot if approved by a 60% vote of each house of the North Carolina State Legislature. The measure was then sent to the ballot on July 1, 2010.^[8]^[9]

According to House majority leader Hugh Holliman, he expected the bill to pass through the House quickly and be placed on the ballot this fall.^[10]

North Carolina-Do you know that a convicted felon can be elected and can serve as a county sheriff, according to our State Constitution? The North Carolina Sheriff's Association is strongly opposed to any convicted felon being a sheriff, the head law enforcement official in each county. The North Carolina Sheriff's Association does not want something as crucial and fundamental to professional law enforcement as the public trust to be placed in the hands of a known felon, having been found to be such in a court of law.

This week, the North Carolina Sheriff's Association reaffirmed its support for Senate Bill 351, No Felon as Sheriff, a legislative bill currently pending in the North Carolina General Assembly that is eligible for consideration in the legislative session that convenes on May 12th. The Association first supported this legislation in early 2009, but the legislation was not enacted into law. Last year's decision by the Association to support Senate Bill 351 was reaffirmed in a unanimous vote by those sheriffs in attendance at the Association's annual Spring Meeting.

If enacted into law by the General Assembly, Senate Bill 351 would place on the ballot in November 2010, a constitutional amendment to be voted upon by the people of North Carolina that would prohibit a convicted felon from serving as sheriff in our state. Under current law, a convicted felon who has fully completed the sentence imposed by the court automatically has their "rights restored" by operation of law, and is then eligible to vote and to hold public office in North Carolina, including among others, the Office of Sheriff.

Sheriff James Knight of Edgecombe County, president of the Association said: "The sheriffs of North Carolina vigorously support this legislation and adamantly believe that a convicted felon should not be allowed to run for or be elected or appointed as sheriff in our great state. The standards for our deputy sheriffs established by the sheriffs and other members of the North Carolina Sheriff's Education and Training Standards Commission prohibit a convicted felon from being certified as a deputy sheriff. The constitutional amendment sought by Senate Bill 351 will apply this same standard to the men and women who serve in the constitutional Office of Sheriff."

"It is the position of the sheriffs of North Carolina that a convicted felon should be barred from holding any elective office in our state, but the Association is continuing to focus its efforts on getting this restriction applied to the Office of Sheriff," said Sheriff Jerry Monette of Craven County, chairman of the Association's Executive Committee. Sheriff Monette continued: "during the upcoming 2010 session of the North Carolina General Assembly that

begins in May, we will be working with our friends in the legislature on both sides of the aisle to get this important legislation enacted so the voters can help us get this constitutional amendment adopted on Election Day this November."

The North Carolina Sheriff's Association is the professional organization of our state's sheriffs and includes as members all of the 100 sheriffs in North Carolina. In the discussion of this issue by the sheriffs, they noted that it is regrettable that convicted felons have filed to run for election to the Office of Sheriff this year, but the sheriffs have confidence that the public will ensure that no convicted felon is elected as sheriff.

Sheriff Sam Page of Rockingham County, first vice president of the Association, noted: "We respect and fully support the constitutional right of the citizens of each of North Carolina's 100 counties to make the decision at the ballot box about who will serve their county as sheriff. However, we are united in our belief that the North Carolina Constitution should be amended to prohibit a convicted felon from serving as an elected or appointed sheriff. As North Carolina's sheriffs, we want our fellow citizens to know that many hardships will result if a convicted felon is allowed to serve as the chief law enforcement officer in the county responsible for protecting and serving you and other citizens in your county."

Federal law prohibits a convicted from from possessing a firearm. Integrity, professionalism and the confidence of the public in our criminal justice system requires that convicted felons not be eligible to dserve as sheriff.

Today - across our state and throughout the nation - sheriffs continue to exercise vitally important responsibilities. In the State of North Carolina, sheriffs are constitutional officers elected by the people of their counties. On call 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, the responsibilities of their Office include:

- *Patrolling the counties and enforcing the law
- *Maintaining and operating jails
- *Serving civil process papers, essential to all legal actions
- *Providing security for North Carolina's courtrooms
- *Serving as the public's elected representatives for law enforcement and public safety matters
- *Maintaining custody of evidence, including firearms, in criminal court cases

The Office of Sheriff is the oldest and most respected elected office in America, having been brought to this country by the colonists from England. The founding fathers of our nation made it an elected office because they were determined that the sheriff would be directly responsible and accountable to the people. North Carolina's sheriffs take pride in their office and they take seriously their duties and responsibilities to the people of North Carolina.

WINSTON-SALEM (AP) — Four felons who ran for sheriff in North Carolina all lost this week, but a legislator says he'll still push for a bill to prevent felons from running.

The [Winston-Salem Journal reported today](#) that Sen. Stan Bingham said he'll continue pushing the bill even though the men lost. The Republican proposed his bill in anticipation that Gerald Hege would run for his old job as Davidson County sheriff.

Hege lost to Sheriff David Grice in Tuesday's GOP primary. Hege had pleaded guilty to two felony counts that resulted from a sweeping investigation of the sheriff's office.

Bingham says he'll push the bill as long as the N.C. Sheriff's Association supports it. The association voted unanimously in March to back the bill.

Former Washington County Sheriff Stanley James also lost.

Sen. Stan Bingham filed [S 351: No Felon as Sheriff](#) earlier this month, and I've had it rattling around on my to-do list for a while. (Dome posted on it [here](#).)

Currently, a sheriff can't hire someone as a deputy who has been convicted of a felony. But, as long as someone has had their voting rights restored, a convicted felon can run to be sheriff.

Bingham's bill would put a constitutional amendment before voters. If enacted, it would add the following to the qualifications for sheriff:

No person is eligible to serve as Sheriff if that person has been adjudged guilty of any felony against this State or the United States, or of a felony in another state that also would be a felony if it had been committed in this State, whether or not that person has been restored to the rights of citizenship in the manner prescribed by law.

Who might this apply to? Well, Bingham is from Davidson County and there have been rumors - [See this discussion on the Lexington Dispatch's forums page](#) - that former Davidson County Sheriff Gerald Hege might give it a go in 2010.

Hege, for those of you who don't remember, was once dubbed "America's toughest sheriff," but ended up pleading guilty to two felonies in 2004. From a News & Record story in 2007 when Hege finished his probation:

The probation stemmed from his guilty plea in May 2004 to two felony counts of obstruction of justice for attempts to cover up money missing from the vice and narcotics unit of the sheriff's department. He resigned from the office he had held since being elected in 1994.

During Hege's first year of probation, he was under house arrest with an electronic monitoring ankle bracelet and was allowed to leave his home only for work, said Keith Acree, a spokesman for the N.C. Department of Corrections.

[snip]

Hege also paid \$7,900 in court-ordered fees and restitution, Acree said. Hege completed 50 hours of community service working in the kitchen of the Salvation Army in Lexington.

Hege's guilty plea in 2004 ended a nine-year tenure as sheriff marked by his eccentric tactics: pink jail cells, paramilitary garb and media grandstanding. Hege generated national - and even international - attention for some of his techniques.

The criminal case against Hege stemmed from a State Bureau of Investigation probe that involved testimony from 28 of his own employees, including two top supervisors.

There were allegations Hege ordered prisoner abuse, promoted racial profiling, recklessly drove his sheriff's car and misused county personnel and equipment. But it was Hege's attempts to cover up money missing from the department's vice and narcotics unit that sealed his fate.

As a convicted felon, Hege couldn't carry a firearm, but he could hold the office.

Bingham said that he was contacted by several Piedmont area sheriff's asking him to run the bill. When asked if it was in direct response to the possibility Hege will run again, Bingham said, "Of course it is, Hege and others. He's not the only one."

Bingham said he expected Hege to run in 2010 but said the prospects for getting his bill through the General Assembly weren't good. That's because amendments to the state's constitution are scrutinized closely by members who are reticent about changing the state's foundational document.

So, was Bingham concerned about a Hege run in 2010?

"Absolutely he'll run again, but I don't think he'll get elected," Bingham said. "But there's no doubt about it, he's going to run."

Voters poised to judge sheriffs' qualifications

RALEIGH (AP) — Voters in six counties decided in May they didn't want former lawbreakers as their sheriffs. Now voters across North Carolina are poised to get a chance this November to remove them permanently from the candidate pool for the centuries-old office.

The House unanimously agreed Wednesday with the Senate's proposed constitutional amendment to prohibit convicted felons from serving as sheriff. The chamber will need to approve the language one more time Thursday before it shows up on the Nov. 2 ballot. A majority of voters would have to agree to the amendment before it's embossed in the constitution.

Six candidates for sheriff who are known felons ran unsuccessfully during the May 4 primary election, including ex-Washington County Sheriff Stanley James and former Davidson County Sheriff Gerald Hege. They all lost. But they shouldn't be qualified to run to begin with, said Sen. Stan Bingham, R-Davidson, the bill's chief proponent.

"This shouldn't have to be, especially if you've got a CEO of a large law enforcement agency," said Bingham, who worked hard to get Hege defeated in May. "It's a little bit different being a felon and getting a job at Hardee's, or somewhere else."

The North Carolina Constitution has few restrictions for people running for elected office. There are minimum ages to serve as governor or in the Legislature. Judges, district attorneys and the attorney general must be duly "authorized to practice law in the courts of this state." Convicted felons can seek office — including sheriff — once their rights of citizenship are restored, usually when they have completed their punishment.

The North Carolina Sheriffs Association has pushed for the restriction on the office, arguing it's a matter of ethics for a county's top elected law enforcement officer to follow the law. The association's standards already bar convicted felons from serving as deputy sheriffs.

A convicted felon also is barred from owning a gun, which could put a sheriff at a disadvantage, especially in small departments where the sheriff is more than an administrator, said Rep. Dan Ingle, R-Alamance, before the bill was tentatively approved in the House by a vote of 112-0.

While the association isn't aware of felon being elected a sheriff, Edgecombe County Sheriff James Knight, said he believes the large number of felons who ran last month has helped lawmakers take up an issue the association has pushed for years.

"It's sort of hit home and reality set in once they saw the people that were running for sheriff," said Knight, the association's president.

Association lobbyist Eddie Caldwell said he knew of no opposition to the bill. But at least one of the primary candidates — David Morrow of Cleveland County — said there's no need to change the constitution because voters are already making their feelings known when they cast ballots in the sheriff's races. Morrow has run for sheriff four times and received 26 percent of the vote in May's Republican primary.

"That issue is already decided by the people when they vote," said Morrow, who served nine months in prison on what he called a drug-related felony conspiracy charge. He got out of prison 19 years ago Thursday. He said he was innocent of the charge stemming from \$300 in marijuana sold on his property.

Hege files to run for sheriff in Davidson

LEXINGTON (MCT) — Almost six years after leaving the Davidson County Sheriff's Office in disgrace, former Sheriff Gerald K. Hege filed election paperwork yesterday in a bid to get his old job back.

Meanwhile, incumbent Sheriff David Grice, also a Republican, said yesterday that he will file for re-election on Monday.

Hege, wearing black jeans and a black leather jacket and surrounded by about a dozen supporters, entered the Davidson County Board of Elections office just before noon and gave his filing information to elections director Ruth Honeycutt.

"Have you ever been convicted of a felony?" Honeycutt asked at one point.

"Yes," Hege answered.

"What was the offense?" she asked.

"Obstruction of justice," he replied.

Hege stumbled over some of the questions — such as the date that his citizenship was restored — but otherwise it was a routine filing that was over in a matter of minutes.

"I love it," he said of being sheriff. "I thought I did a good job at it."


As a convicted felon, Hege would not be allowed to carry a gun, although he said he might work later to have that right restored.

"I'm not worried about that at all," he said.

A gun doesn't always help on the job, Hege said. One thing that all law-enforcement officers who have been recently killed in the line of duty have in common is that they were armed at the time they were killed, he said.

In May 2004 Hege pleaded guilty to two felony counts of obstruction of justice in connection with allegations of corruption within his department.

Hege had been charged with 15 felony counts. Garry Frank, the district attorney for Davidson County, gathered

sworn affidavits from more than 30 sheriff's deputies and associates of Hege's and used them as the basis of the criminal charges. Hege never served prison time, and his probation ended in 2007.

Asked if he would do anything differently, Hege said he would probably hire an attorney and put him in an office directly across from his because he didn't pay close enough attention to the paperwork part of the job. He said he would pay for the attorney out of his sheriff's salary.

Hege will be running to replace Grice, who said that crime has decreased under his watch, and that he has run the office in an honest, cost-effective way and has returned civility and dignity to the office.

Grice was appointed to fill Hege's seat in 2004 and was elected to the position in 2006.

"I feel like I've earned a second term," Grice said.

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Bill would bar felons from sheriff's office



GREENSBORO — Rockingham County Sheriff Sam Page tries to picture a convicted felon walking into schools and churches with a sheriff's badge on to talk about obeying the law.

"I just don't see how you can look people in the face if you're sheriff — and you're a convicted felon — and do your job," Page said.

Page and dozens of other members of the N.C. Sheriffs' Association are supporting N.C. Senate Bill 351 — called "No Felon as Sheriff" — to prohibit a felon from becoming sheriff.

The bill was first introduced by Republican state Sen. Stan Bingham, who represents Davidson and Guilford counties, in 2009 and is pending in the N.C. General Assembly.

If enacted, the bill would be placed on the Nov. 2 ballot as a state constitutional amendment.

It would not affect anyone running for office this year.

Under current law, convicted felons who have completed their sentence automatically have their rights restored, meaning they can vote and hold public office in North Carolina.

However, federal law prohibits a convicted felon from having a gun.

Eddie Caldwell, the sheriffs' association's executive vice president, said he has heard of five or six convicted felons running for sheriff in the state this year.

Gerald Hege, a Davidson County Republican and former sheriff once called "America's toughest sheriff," is one such candidate.

"It really doesn't affect me," Hege said of the bill being put on the ballot.

He said the push by the sheriffs' association, a group to which he never belonged, was just "for political reasons."

In May 2004, Hege, the sitting sheriff at the time, pleaded guilty to two felony counts of obstruction of justice in connection with corrupt activity in his department.

Hege didn't serve prison time; his probation ended in 2007.

Other candidates:

I Former Washington County Sheriff Stanley James is vying for his old position after serving prison time for embezzlement.

I David Morrow, a candidate in Cleveland County, has a felony drug conviction from 1991, records show.

I Robert "Nub" Taylor is running for Avery County sheriff for a second time despite pleading guilty to obstruction of justice in 2006 .

I Mark Stewart, a candidate in McDowell County, was convicted of selling drugs in 1987 and possessing drugs in 1998, records show.

Guilford County Sheriff BJ Barnes said his support for the bill is not in direct opposition to any of those candidates.

"Basically what it amounts to is if a deputy sheriff had a charge, he could not be a deputy sheriff, so why should the person who has the same charges be able to be sheriff?"

Page said he would talk to lawmakers, urging them to approve the bill.

"I think the voters will make the right decision — which they should — to hold the sheriff to higher standards than we currently are right now."

Page will become the association's president at its meeting in July. At that meeting, Page said the sheriffs most likely will talk about the possibility of a convicted felon becoming a member of the association.

"I think that having a person that was a convicted felon would undermine what the association strives to do, which again is to raise the standard with our training, with our expertise," Page said.

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Sen. Bingham on "No Felon as Sheriff"

Senate Bill 351 has become a hot topic as of late. The "No Felon as Sheriff" bill aims to place on the ballot in November a state constitutional amendment to be voted upon by N.C. residents that would prohibit a convicted felon from serving as sheriff.

Sen. Stan Bingham who introduced the bill in 2009, said the amendment probably would not affect any convicted felons that could be elected sheriff in November. The change would probably not have the power to retroactively oust a sheriff. Bingham said that it would create more problems, such as more elections and more spending of scarce funds.

Bingham said he would have a tough enough job trying to get the N.C. General Assembly to vote on it during short session. The legislative session convenes May 12. It has taken him four years to get some bills passed, he said.

When asked if "No Felon as Sheriff" would be on the ballot for voters in November, he said, "That's really likely that it will not. I just don't think we're going to have time."

What was the main inspiration behind the bill? The affidavits from the case against **Gerald Hege**, who is running for his old position as Davidson County sheriff.

"That will inspire you to do a lot of things," Bingham said. "God knows he's bad news. I mean he's one mean son of a gun."

In May 2004, Hege, the sitting sheriff at the time, pleaded guilty to two felony counts of obstruction of justice in connection with corrupt activity in his department.

Hege didn't serve prison time; his probation ended in 2007 .

Bingham also got a push from other law enforcement officials, who said Hege was not a "team player" and could not work well with other agencies.

"That's a success of any law enforcement agency – is working together," Bingham said.

Bingham has another partner willing to work with him and he said he's glad that the N.C. Sheriffs' Association is backing him up on the bill.

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Signs in Davidson indicate Hege may consider another run at sheriff

DAVIDSON COUNTY – Five years after pleading guilty to two felony counts of obstruction of justice, former Davidson County Sheriff Gerald Hege may be considering a run for sheriff in 2010.

Signs supporting the controversial sheriff are popping up in Davidson County, according to WXII-TV.

Attempts by The High Point Enterprise to reach Hege for comment were unsuccessful Friday.

Hege resigned as sheriff in 2004 and pleaded guilty to two felony counts of obstruction of justice for attempting to cover up money missing from the vice and narcotics unit of the sheriff's department. The former sheriff, who was elected in 1994, ended his probation in May 2007.

After finishing his probation and as a convicted felon, Hege could vote and also run for sheriff again. Under state and federal law, Hege can never own a gun even if he is ever re-elected to the post of sheriff because he is a convicted felon.

According to Ruth Huneycutt, director of the Davidson County Board of Elections, Hege registered as a Republican in Oct. 10, 2008.

Huneycutt said Hege's background was checked to make sure he had completed his probation before he could be registered to vote again.

On Friday, Davidson County Sheriff David Grice said he will run for sheriff in 2010, but would not comment on the potential candidacy of Hege. Grice has been in office since 2004 as he was appointed by the Republican Party to fill the seat of Hege. He easily retained the office of sheriff in 2006 for a four-year term with a victory over Roy Holman.

"I'm definitely going to be running on the Republican ticket in 2010," Grice said. "I'm not going to comment much about any candidacy or so forth. It's too early to get back and forth on that. We have done a good job under my administration, and I think I have earned a second term."

Sen. Stan Bingham, R-Davidson, said a bill that would have amended the North Carolina Constitution to make convicted felons ineligible to hold the office of sheriff is "now a dead issue." The bill, which was introduced by Bingham, was dropped for consideration in the N.C. Senate because it required a constitutional amendment, Bingham said. He said he introduced the bill on behalf of three sheriffs in adjoining counties because felons aren't able to carry guns.

"It seemed an injustice that you could hire 100 officers that could carry guns and you are the boss and you can't even carry one," Bingham said. "It seemed like a discrepancy in the law in my opinion and that was the purpose of introducing this as an issue of fairness."

So to explain to all of the people who are not sure of what a Sheriff consists of i have provided a explanation of the reference or term sheriff below.

A sheriff is in principle a legal official with responsibility for a county. In practice, the specific combination of legal, political, and ceremonial duties of a sheriff varies greatly from country to country.

The word "sheriff" is a contraction of the term "shire reeve". The term, from the Old English scirgerefa, designated a royal official responsible for keeping the peace (a "reeve") throughout a shire or county on behalf of the king.[1] The term was preserved in England notwithstanding the Norman Conquest. From England the term spread to several other countries, like Scotland, Ireland, and the United States.

The position of sheriff now exists in various countries:

* Sheriffs are administrative legal officials (similar to bailiffs) in Ireland, Australia, and Canada.

* Sheriffs are judges in Scotland.

* Sheriff is a ceremonial position in England, Wales and India.

* In the United States of America the role of a sheriff varies between different states and counties. In many rural areas, sheriffs and their deputies are the principal form of police, while in urban areas they may have more specialized duties, such as prisoner transport, serving warrants, service of process or police administration.

In the United States, a sheriff is generally, but not always, the highest law enforcement officer of a county. A sheriff is in most cases elected by the population of the county. In some states the sheriff is officially titled "High Sheriff", although the title is very rarely actually used.

The political election of a person to serve as a police leader is an almost uniquely American tradition. (The practice has been followed in the British Channel Island of Jersey since at least the 16th century.[3]) A sworn law enforcement officer working for a sheriff is called a "sheriff's deputy", "sheriff's officer", or something similar, and is authorized to perform the sheriff's duties. In some states, a sheriff may not be a sworn officer, but merely an elected official in charge of sworn officers. These officers may be subdivided into "general deputies" and "special deputies". In some places, the sheriff has the responsibility to recover any deceased persons within their county, in which case the full title is "sheriff-coroner". In some counties, the sheriff's principal deputy is the warden of the county jail or other local correctional institution.

In some areas of the United States, the sheriff is also responsible for collecting the taxes and may have other titles such as tax collector or county treasurer. Although rare, the sheriff may also be responsible for the county civil defense, emergency disaster service, rescue service, or emergency management.

In the U.S., the relationship between the sheriff and other police departments varies widely from state to state, and indeed in some states from county to county. In the northeastern U.S., the sheriff's duties have been greatly reduced with the advent of state-level law enforcement agencies, especially the state police and local agencies such as the county police. In Vermont, for instance, the elected sheriff is primarily an officer of the County Court, whose duties include running the county jail and serving papers in lawsuits and foreclosures. Law enforcement patrol is performed as well, in support of State Police and in the absence of a municipal police agency in rural towns. Some such towns contract with the sheriff to provide dedicated law enforcement presence in lieu of creating a local police force.

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Bill to bar felons as sheriffs advances

TRIAD – A leader in the state House of Representatives said he expects quick passage of a bill that would allow voters to decide this fall whether to bar felons from serving as a county sheriff in North Carolina.

Rep. Hugh Holliman, D-Davidson and House majority leader, said the bill that passed in the state Senate Wednesday was assigned Thursday for consideration by a House committee.

"I think it will pass and move quickly through the House," Holliman said.

If the House approves the legislation as passed by the Senate, the constitutional amendment referendum issue would be set for the Nov. 2 general election ballot.

Sen. Stan Bingham, R-Davidson and primary sponsor of Senate version of the legislation, originally introduced the bill during last year's session. But it failed to pass the General Assembly in 2009.

A primary motive for Bingham is to prevent former Davison County Sheriff Gerald Hege, who pleaded guilty to felony obstruction of justice counts six years ago, from becoming Davidson County sheriff again.

Hege made a comeback bid during the spring primary, but was beaten soundly for the Republican Party nomination by Sheriff David Grice May 4. Hege said following the primary defeat that he was retiring from politics.

Hege was among a handful of convicted felons running for sheriff seats throughout the state this year. All were defeated in the primaries.

If the constitutional amendment is approved by voters this fall, it would preclude Hege from ever running again for sheriff in North Carolina.

Bingham said he's asked sheriffs of both parties to contact their representatives in Raleigh to encourage a speedy House concurrence of the bill.

"I hope the House acts quickly. A lot of the legislators on the House side are going to be getting calls from their sheriffs to indicate their feelings about the importance of this," Bingham said Thursday.

At a glance

House Bill 1307 would give North Carolina voters the chance to decide in the Nov. 2 general election whether to amend the North Carolina Constitution to provide that no person convicted of a felony is eligible to be elected a county sheriff.

A Senate version of the legislation passed this week. The bill now awaits what's known as concurrence by the House.

If a majority of votes cast in the general election are in favor of the proposal, the State Board of Elections would certify the amendment to the N.C. Secretary of State. The constitutional amendment is effective upon certification.

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



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OUR VIEW: Don't handcuff voters for sheriff

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The N.C. House of Representatives was expected to give final approval to legislation today that calls for a statewide vote in November on a constitutional amendment barring convicted felons from running for sheriff in North Carolina.

Approved last week in the N.C. Senate by a 46-1 vote, after House approval the bill will go to Gov. Beverly Perdue's desk where she's also expected to sign it, setting up the Nov. 2 constitutional amendment referendum.

If all goes as expected, Tarheel voters will see on the ballot:

[] For [] Against

Constitutional amendment providing that no person convicted of a felony may serve as Sheriff."

Earlier this year, we said this legislation, House Bill 1307, was all about former Davidson County Sheriff Gerald Hege. When we wrote that last spring, the former sheriff and convicted felon was poised to run in the May Republican primary for sheriff in Davidson County.

But no, we were told, this wasn't about just Hege because a handful of other convicted felons across North Carolina were running for sheriff's posts. It was about the notion that any convicted felon should be barred from seeking a sheriff's post.

OK, we'll concede that point; maybe Sen. Stan Bingham, R-Davidson, and House Majority Leader Hugh Holliman, D-Davidson, both strong backers of the bill, and a host of others weren't out just to derail Hege's re-election chances or his ability to serve if he won the primary and general election.

But Hege's bid for re-election surely was derailed - by the voters of Davidson County. In virtually a three-candidate race, current Sheriff David Grice handily won the primary, whipping Hege by a 61 percent to 25 percent total. And in that handful of other sheriff's races around the state featuring felons, the voters said no to the felons there, too.

Give the voters in Davidson County and in those other areas across the state credit for letting their preferences be known, which in these cases were not the felons. So why does the Legislature even need to approve such a bill calling for this referendum? Let the voters in each county around the state decide whom they want to be their sheriff - felon or no felon. We don't place such prohibitions on other offices.

But since we're apparently going to have a referendum Nov. 2, let us go ahead and mark our ballot now:

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HEGE PETITION: Protest group awaits hearing on former sheriff's bid to get old job back

LEXINGTON – A group of Davidson County residents challenging former Davidson County sheriff Gerald Hege's bid to get his old job back could get a hearing next week.

The Davidson County Board of Elections dismissed the group's original complaints Tuesday because the challengers failed to give complete addresses and telephone numbers and because their affidavits did not say what they wanted officials to do about Hege's candidacy.

In their new affidavits, the challengers say they want Hege's name removed from the ballot. Early primary voting began April 15. Hege is one of three Republicans in the primary. The elections board is scheduled to meet next Monday.

"We do not want a convicted felon elected sheriff," said Melisia Prout, the president of Salvation's Way and a Forsyth County resident who organized the challenge. The challengers say Hege, a convicted felon, would be in direct violation of N.C. G.S. 14-415.1 if elected because he would have control over firearms in the sheriff's department.

"I respect their right to do this," Hege said after the dismissal. "That does not upset me. The president of the United States does not carry a firearm. He can blow up the world in about 2 minutes. And the governor as head of the National Guard does not carry a weapon. I see no big deal with it. As sheriff, I would have no need to grab a firearm every morning when I wake up."

Hege claims the complaint does not make sense and should have been handled before voting started.

"The state constitution allows me to run for office, and you can't change the constitution by protest," Hege said. "Time is running out."

State law allows for residents to challenge candidates no later than 10 business days after the close of the candidate's filing periods, but because the complaints were filed last week, the board determined they were a protest and not a challenge.

Prout, a former Davidson County resident, couldn't sign an affidavit.

"I do not support any candidate in this election," she said.

The board could hear the complaints at any time while voters cast their ballots, said County Attorney Chuck Frye.

"The statute allows an amended protest, and they can file that at any time," Frye said. "The board can consider this if the protest meets the legal requirements and then decide on when a hearing can be held. There is also a potential that the hearing may not be held until after the election."


Hege resigned as sheriff in 2004 after pleading guilty to two felony counts of obstruction of justice for attempting to cover up money missing from the vice and narcotics unit of the sheriff's department.

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Article 54A.

The Felony Firearms Act.

§ 14-415.1. Possession of firearms, etc., by felon prohibited.

(a) It shall be unlawful for any person who has been convicted of a felony to purchase,

own, possess, or have in his custody, care, or control any firearm or any weapon of mass death

and destruction as defined in G.S. 14-288.8.

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Former Sheriff Hege still has staunch supporters

LEXINGTON – Local residents who were eating lunch Tuesday at the Barbecue Center in Lexington said they have mixed feelings about former Davidson County Sheriff Gerald Hege possibly trying to get his old job back.

Signs have been popping up in Davidson County in support of Hege for sheriff. Hege said Tuesday, while at his home, that he is "testing the waters" by placing the signs supporting his candidacy in the county. An announcement on his potential candidacy will be made in November, he said.

"I don't believe everything I heard whenever he was convicted," said Shannon Queen of High Point. "I don't believe it. I think he pushed some of the wrong buttons he shouldn't have pushed. I don't think he made mistakes. I think he p.....d off the wrong people."

Queen said he supported the former sheriff's controversial tactics, such as making inmates wear color-coordinated jumpsuits to identify their offense. Queen said he had his license checked by Hege at one of the former sheriff's checkpoints.

Lexington resident Ralph Jackson said he doesn't support Hege, but he believes the former sheriff will be re-elected.

"I believe he would get elected because there is too many people who like him in Lexington," Jackson said. "I heard two years ago he was going to run."

Jackson said he is concerned about Hege not being able to carry a gun as sheriff of Davidson County. Under state and federal law, a convicted felon can't carry a gun.

"He is a crook," Jackson alleged. "He has done what he did one time. He will do it again."

Sonny Grooms, an Ellerbe resident, said he hopes Hege gets to be sheriff again.

"I'd support him because he was doing good work, just like the soldier boots and all," Grooms said. "The only thing I know, he was running the sheriff's office like criminals needed to be handled. I know he enforced the laws. That was his job."

Know Your Voting Rights

STEPS FOR FORMER FELONS

If you are convicted of a felony in North Carolina, you lose your citizenship rights, including the right to vote. However, after completing all terms of your sentence (including parole, probation and restitution), you do not have to do anything to have your citizenship rights, including your voting rights, restored. Those rights are automatically restored.

If you have completed all parts of your sentence for a felony conviction or have been pardoned, you are eligible to vote in North Carolina. In order to vote, follow the steps listed below.

IN ADDITION TO THE INSTRUCTIONS BELOW, YOU CAN ALSO REGISTER AND VOTE ON THE SAME DAY, IN PERSON, AT A ONE-STOP VOTING SITE DURING THE "EARLY VOTING" PERIOD BEFORE EACH ELECTION (BUT NOT ON ELECTION DAY ITSELF). To learn about Same-Day Registration, go to: [Link](#)

STEP 1: REGISTER TO VOTE

» Former convicted felons must fill out a voter registration form even if you were registered before your conviction. You can register at any point after completing all parts of your sentence.

» You can register to vote by mail. Get a mail-in voter registration form by writing or calling your County Board of Elections office, visiting a public library, or downloading it online at [Link](#).

» On the form, it asks "where you now live." Use your home address (not a post office box). A postcard confirming your registration will be sent there.

» Mail in the completed form, with copies of any documents it requests, so the County Board of Elections receives it at least 25 days before the election.

» The County Board of Elections will send you a postcard, telling you which precinct you will vote in and where you can go to vote.

STEP 2: VOTE

» You can vote at the polling place listed on the card or by absentee ballot.

» For directions on how to vote by absentee ballot, see Step 2 below under "Steps for Misdemeanants."

Officers say statistics were `fixed'

When Sheriff Gerald Hege took office in 1994, about 1,000 burglaries were reported to the sheriff's office every year. By 1998, that number had fallen to about 400. Last year, it was 33.

Forcible rape also declined from about 20 reported incidents per year in the mid-1990s to three in 1997. No rapes have been reported to the sheriff's office since 1999. And recent statistics show aggravated assaults - which numbered more than 150 in 1994 - fell to only five for the entire year of 2000, although they have since risen.

Statistics such as these allowed Hege in 2001 to claim a 62 percent drop in crime since he took office. Hege attributed the decrease to his high-profile image and aggressive style of law enforcement, but affidavits from Hege's top officers now say the sheriff ordered them to manipulate the numbers.

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

Answers: How Can a Convicted Felon Run for Office?

Q. How can a convicted felon run for office? – D.S.

A. They aren't able to do so everywhere – many states do bar felons from running for or holding office. But that's not the case for federal offices or for offices in North Carolina.

The U.S. Constitution sets out the requirements for a person to run for federal offices, and the N.C. Constitution sets out the requirements to run for state offices. Neither says that a felony conviction disqualifies a person from serving in office.

For example, the U.S. Constitution says that to run for senator, a person must be at least 30 years old, a U.S. citizen for at least nine years, and an inhabitant of the state that elects him or her. As a report from the Congressional Research Service says, "Once a person meets the three constitutional qualifications of age, citizenship and inhabitancy in the State when elected, that person, if duly elected, is constitutionally 'qualified' to serve in Congress, even if a convicted felon."

The N.C. Constitution does say that a person is disqualified from running for office if they cannot vote in the election, and felons lose the right to vote until their citizenship rights are restored. Under state law, citizenship rights are automatically restored once all the terms of a felon's sentence, including probation or parole, are completed.

An example of this is Gerald Hege, the former sheriff of Davidson County who pleaded guilty in 2004 to obstruction of justice. He completed his probation in 2007, so he was eligible to file this year to run again for sheriff, which he has.

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

A Possible Ban; Some NC Legislatures are Pushing to Ban Convicted Felons from Running for Office

The Primary Elections have now passed.

Did you know that according to Fox8, there were four (4) convicted felons that ran for Sheriff, in North Carolina? Now that the results are in from the Primary Elections, all four (4) of the candidates running for Sheriff, lost! One included (around the Piedmont Triad), was Gerald Hege.

In a recent article written, it was noted that a petition to prevent Gerald Hege from running for Sheriff, was denied. However, it was also noted that an affidavit has been submitted, noting that a Sheriff has to carry a concealed weapon. 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Bill gets key help: Sheriffs' group favors keeping felons out of race

Members of the N.C. Sheriffs' Association have voted to support a bill in the N.C. Senate that would prohibit convicted felons from running for sheriff.

No such restriction exists now, so nothing bars such candidates as Gerald Hege from running. Hege was the sheriff of Davidson County until he pleaded guilty to felony counts, and served his sentence. He is running for his old position.

The vote of support came yesterday during a meeting of the association in Wrightsville Beach. Those present voted unanimously to back the bill, said the group's president, James L. Knight of Edgecombe County.

Knight said that the association's vote wasn't aimed at any particular candidates, and he pointed out that Hege isn't the only convicted felon running for sheriff in North Carolina this year. The issue, he said, is a matter of trust for the office.

"We want the office to be a place of integrity," he said. "We're trying to let people know that we stand for what is good."

Knight said he didn't know of any felons who had been elected sheriff, nor could anyone at the meeting when asked.

The bill was sponsored in February 2009 by state Sen. Stan Bingham, R-Davidson, but it never came up for a vote.

Bingham said he introduced the bill in anticipation of a potential Hege run for the office. At that time, Hege had not announced that he was running.

Bingham said that the bill stalled because it would take an amendment to the state's constitution for it to pass, which would involve a long and complicated path.

He said he hasn't given up on the bill, and is looking for ways to ban felons from running for sheriff without tinkering with the constitution. He said he will try to revive the bill in the next session of the legislature in May, but even if it passed, it is unlikely that it would take effect in time for the 2010 general election in November.

Bingham said that part of the reason that the bill is needed is because current guidelines put more restrictions on hiring deputies than electing sheriffs.

"It's a bit hypocritical that a sheriff can be a convicted felon but he can't hire one to be a deputy," Bingham said.

Hege said that Bingham came up with the idea in an attempt to keep him from challenging incumbent Sheriff David Grice.

"He's trying to change the North Carolina Constitution to stop one man," Hege said.

Grice, who did not attend the sheriffs' association meeting, declined to comment.

In September 2003, Hege was indicted on 15 felony counts -- five counts of obtaining property by false pretense, five counts of embezzlement by a public officer, two counts of common-law obstruction of justice, and one count each of endeavor to intercept oral communication, aiding and abetting an endeavor to intercept oral communication, and aiding and abetting obtaining property by false pretense.

The charges were the result of a sweeping investigation of the sheriff's office that included affidavits from more than 20 sheriff's officers and staff members. Hege ultimately pleaded guilty to two felony counts of obstruction of justice and was

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removed from office.

But he is not the only felon running for sheriff. For example, Robert E. "Nub" Taylor, a former clerk of court in Avery County, is making his second run for the office after his 2006 candidacy ended in his arrest. According to records when Taylor filed for office, he was convicted of obstruction of justice on May 1, 2006 and served several months in prison. His citizenship was restored after his release in November 2006, said Sheila Ollis, Avery County's elections director.

And in Washington County, Stanley James has filed to run for sheriff despite a felony conviction for embezzlement.

Hege said he was unaware that other felons were running.

"I guess I started something," he joked.

He said that the law that allows people vote and run for office once their debt to society is paid should remain.

The N.C. Sheriffs' Association, which is based in Raleigh, is made up of the sheriffs from the state's 100 counties.

Hege has had issues with the organization in the past. At one point when he was sheriff, he was the only sheriff in the state who was not a member of the organization.

Hege said that the organization used his likeness to raise money when he was sheriff. That confused people who thought that they were donating to him, he said.

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NC sheriffs urge ban on felons running

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Want General Assembly to approve the bill

WRIGHTSVILLE BEACH, N.C. (AP) - The group representing North Carolina sheriffs says it wants the General Assembly to approve a bill to prevent convicted felons from running for sheriff.

Members of the North Carolina Sheriff's Association meeting this week in Wrightsville Beach reaffirmed their support for a measure in the state Senate to amend the North Carolina constitution.

The association says its standards bar convicted felons from serving as deputy sheriffs and says the same should apply to a constitutional office such as sheriff. Convicted felons are allowed to vote and run for office once they have had their rights restored by completing their punishments.

The Winston-Salem Journal reported at least three convicted felons are running for sheriff this year, including former Davidson County Sheriff Gerald Hege.

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Voters in six counties decided in May they didn't want former lawbreakers as their sheriffs. Now voters across North Carolina are poised to get a chance this November to remove them permanently from the candidate pool for the centuries-old office.

The House unanimously agreed Wednesday with the Senate's proposed constitutional amendment to prohibit convicted felons from serving as sheriff. The chamber will need to approve the language one more time Thursday before it shows up on the Nov. 2 ballot. A majority of voters would have to agree to the amendment before it's embossed in the constitution.

Six candidates for sheriff who are known felons ran unsuccessfully during the May 4 primary election, including ex-Washington County Sheriff Stanley James and former Davidson County Sheriff Gerald Hege. They all lost. But they shouldn't be qualified to run to begin with, said Sen. Stan Bingham, R-Davidson, the bill's chief proponent.

"This shouldn't have to be, especially if you've got a CEO of a large law enforcement agency," said Bingham, who worked hard to get Hege defeated in May. "It's a little bit different being a felon and getting a job at Hardee's, or somewhere else."

The North Carolina Constitution has few restrictions for people running for elected office. There are minimum ages to serve as governor or in the Legislature. Judges, district attorneys and the attorney general must be duly "authorized to practice law in the courts of this state." Convicted felons can seek office — including sheriff — once their rights of citizenship are restored, usually when they have completed their punishment.

The North Carolina Sheriffs Association has pushed for the restriction on the office, arguing it's a matter of ethics for a county's top elected law enforcement officer to follow the law. The association's standards already bar convicted felons from serving as deputy sheriffs.

A convicted felon also is barred from owning a gun, which could put a sheriff at a disadvantage, especially in small departments where the sheriff is more than an administrator, said Rep. Dan Ingle, R-Alamance, before the bill was tentatively approved in the House by a vote of 112-0.

While the association isn't aware of felon being elected a sheriff, Edgecombe County Sheriff James Knight, said he believes the large number of felons who ran last month has helped lawmakers take up an issue the association has pushed for years.

"It's sort of hit home and reality set in once they saw the people that were running for sheriff," said Knight, the association's president.

Association lobbyist Eddie Caldwell said he knew of no opposition to the bill. But at least one of the primary candidates — David Morrow of Cleveland County — said there's no need to change the constitution because voters are already making their feelings known when they cast ballots in the sheriff's races. Morrow has run for sheriff four times and received 26 percent of the vote in May's Republican primary.

"That issue is already decided by the people when they vote," said Morrow, who served nine months in prison on what he called a drug-related felony conspiracy charge. He got out of prison 19 years ago Thursday. He said he was innocent of the charge stemming from \$300 in marijuana sold on his property.

Bingham said the voters will get to make a final decision on the issue with the amendment.

If the amendment gets on the ballot, it would mark the first constitutional referendum since 2004, when voters narrowly agreed to a change that made it easier for local governments to issue debt for some public building projects.

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Convicted felons run for sheriff positions across the state

For 10 years, Gerald Hege was arguably one of the most well-known sheriffs in the country.

From his pink jail cells to prison work crews dressed in old fashioned black and white stripes, the sheriff in Davidson County was a regular on national television shows. A hot sauce was even named after him.

Then the man known for driving a black police car adorned with spider images got caught in a web himself.

In 2004, Hege pleaded guilty to two felony counts of obstruction of justice. The plea deal kept him out of jail, but cost him his job.

Six years later, Hege is running for sheriff again, but there is a catch: State law prohibits a convicted felon, including Hege, from carrying a weapon.

He is not the only candidate with a criminal past running for the office of sheriff across the state:

- In Avery County, candidate Robert Nub Taylor was convicted of obstruction of justice as a clerk of court.
- McDowell County's Mark Stewart and Cleveland County candidate David Morrow each have felony drug convictions.
- Wilkes County candidate Willie Tharpe has a felony conviction for receiving stolen goods.
- Former Washington County Sheriff Stanley James was convicted of embezzling, but is running this year in an effort to reclaim the position.
- Ryan White, a candidate for sheriff in Dare County, has pending felony drug charges in two counties.



"The gun issue is not our primary motivating factor. It's an ethics issue," said Eddie Caldwell, spokesman for the North Carolina Sheriff's Association.

The NCSA is pushing for a bill in the state legislature to keep felons from becoming sheriff.

Salvation's Way is also campaigning against the felon candidates.

"The constitutional qualifications are not our main focus," said Melisia Prout, head of the group. "It's

the statutory qualifications you cannot get around. The fact that a convicted felon cannot be in care or control of a firearm, that statute does not say unless elected sheriff."

Hege said he doesn't need to carry a gun to hold the office.

"There's no general statute that I'm aware of that requires a sheriff to carry a firearm. The president of the United States don't carry one. The governor don't carry one, so I don't think one sheriff not carrying one is going to upset anybody," he said.

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Hege's opponents argue that the sheriff is actually in charge of the guns carried by more than 140 Davidson County deputies.

Hege says it's a stretch to say he can't even be around firearms.

"I don't know of any statute that says a felon cannot be around a firearm. I mean, I go to Walmart all the time," Hege said. "Walmart has guns. I go to Walmart. Convicted felons go there everyday."

The Davidson County Board of Elections will hold a full hearing after the May primary to rule on Hege's eligibility.

"Regulations in North Carolina prohibit a convicted felon from becoming a deputy sheriff or any other law enforcement officer in our state," Caldwell said. "The sheriffs believe that same standard that applies to the deputies ought to also apply to the office of sheriff."

The state Senate will consider a bill in the upcoming session of the General Assembly to ban felons from running for sheriff. If the bill passes, the issue would appear on voter ballots in November.

Should a convicted felon be allowed to run for sheriff? Of course not, you say. It makes no sense at all. A felon as your head of county law enforcement? That's crazy!

Not crazy at all. In North Carolina, felons can't be hired as deputy sheriffs, but they can run for sheriff.

A felon can't carry a gun, but can run for sheriff. Except for Sheriff Andy Taylor, carrying a gun - or being allowed to - is pretty much expected of sheriffs.

How often does a felon run for sheriff in North Carolina? More than you think. In Davidson County, the infamous felon Gerald Hege is running for the job he was forced to give up in disgrace in 2004.

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

A former sheriff who served time for embezzlement is running for the sheriff's seat in Washington County.

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A former sheriff who served time for embezzlement is once again running for the sheriff's seat.

The Washington County Board of Elections confirmed Stanley James has filed to run for sheriff.

James is a convicted felon who served about two months in prison, according to the NC Department of Corrections.

James, who had been sheriff in Washington County starting in 1998, was indicted in 2004. He was convicted in 2006 and served time from September 2007 to November 2007.

North Carolina is one of a dozen or so states where a convicted felon can run for office after his or her civil rights are restored. Elections officials say James registered to vote in October 2009 after his voting rights were restored.

Officials do say convicted felons are not permitted to carry firearms in North Carolina.

Elections officials say James has filed to run as a democrat, and that the only other competitor currently in the race is the incumbent sheriff, James Ross. He is also a democrat, so a primary race would be needed.

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



when attempting to limit the
employment possibilities of
convicted felons. As a
criminal attorney, I see
individuals make very unwise
decisions, but these
decisions should not ruin the
rest of their lives. However, at
the same time, felonies are
designed to follow you the
rest of your life; that's part of
the punishment for
committing a crime that rises
to the level of a felony.

All that being said, I have to
agree with the North Carolina
Sheriffs' Association which is
lobbying in support of S.B.
351, No Felon as Sheriff bill.

Convicted Felon Runs For Sheriff

CLEVELAND CO., N.C. -- David Morrow said accountability and leadership make him a good candidate for Cleveland County Sheriff, but the North Carolina Sheriff's Association has its doubts.

Morrow was convicted on felony drug charges in 1991 and, in a release, the organization said convicted felons should not be allowed to run for sheriff.

The association wants voters to decide in November if felons should be barred from office, but Morrow said he thinks it's unnecessary.

Morrow pointed to the former Buncombe County Sheriff, who was convicted of accepting bribes, as proof that non-felons aren't always stellar candidates for the job.

"I think they need to look at their selves before they look at somebody that was convicted over 20 years ago," Morrow said. "I don't see where it is relevant to the job that I can do." Wes Wesmoreland, the head of Cleveland County's Republican party, said Morrow has been a model citizen and Planning Board Chairman.

"I'm more concerned with things being done wrong while in office then I am with things being done wrong 20 years ago," Wesmoreland said.

He said voters should decide who the best candidate for the position is, regardless of whether he is a convicted felon.

Laura Leslie: The state House takes a final vote today on a proposal to amend the state constitution to ban felons from serving as sheriffs. Supporters of the amendment say six convicted felons are running for sheriff's offices statewide, including one who was convicted while serving as sheriff in the past. Alamance Republican Dan Ingle urged other lawmakers to approve the bill, saying sheriffs should be of good moral character.

Dan Ingle: "Changing the constitution is something that certainly nothing any of us should take lightly. But I say this to you – I think when our founding fathers in this great state, when they wrote this constitution, they never thought that a scoundrel or a person committing high crimes would run for sheriff."

Supporters of the measure also point out that convicted felons cannot carry a gun, even as sheriff. It won its first vote unanimously. If it passes the House and Senate, the amendment would go to the voters for approval this November.

NC Sheriffs Support Constitutional Amendment to Ban Convicted Felons From Running For Sheriff's Office

North Carolina's sheriffs are lining up in support of a state Senate bill that seeks to bar convicted felons from being sworn in as sheriffs.

The bill, introduced last year by Sen. Stan Bingham of Davidson County, appears to be aimed squarely at the candidacy of fellow Republican Gerald Hege for sheriff in the senator's home county.

Hege served as sheriff in Davidson from 1994 to 2004, when he was forced to resign after being indicted on 15 felony counts for corruption.

Though as a convicted felon he is forbidden from owning a firearm or serving as a sworn deputy, there is apparently no law that would bar Hege from being sworn in as sheriff. Bingham's bill seeks to remedy that by amending the state constitution to bar felons from taking office as sheriff.

"The sheriffs of North Carolina vigorously support this legislation and adamantly believe that a convicted felon should not be allowed to run for or be elected or appointed as sheriff in our great state," Sheriff James Knight of Edgecombe County, president of the N.C. Sheriffs' Association, said last week in a statement.

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

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Johnson supports bill that would keep felons from serving as sheriffs

Alamance County Sheriff Terry Johnson supports a legislative bill that would ensure that a convicted felon can't serve as a county sheriff.

Under current law, once a convicted felon completes an imposed sentence, that person is eligible to vote and run for office.

Johnson, who attended a N.C. Sheriff's Association training conference this week, spoke in favor of the association's position that supports a ban on convicted felons being allowed to serve as a sheriff in North Carolina, according to an Alamance County Sheriff's Department news release.

"Sheriff Johnson indicated that he felt it was unacceptable to have felons serving as the head law enforcement official in any county of North Carolina," the release states.

State Sen. Stan Bingham, R-Davidson County, introduced the bill in February 2009. In 2003, former Davidson County Sheriff Gerald Hege was indicted on 15 felony counts, including obtaining property by false pretense, embezzlement, obstruction of justice and intercepting oral communication. He eventually pleaded guilty to two counts of obstruction of justice. He received a suspended sentence and was placed on probation.

He resigned as sheriff in 2004, but Hege filed for re-election last month.

When Bingham introduced the bill last year, the sheriff's association voted in support of it. The group reaffirmed that support at the association's spring meeting in Wilmington this week.

The bill is pending and eligible for consideration in the legislative session that convenes May 12. If Senate Bill 351 is enacted into law by the N.C. General Assembly, it would be placed on the ballot in November's election, according to a sheriff's association news release.

The N.C. Sheriff's Education and Training Standards Commission prohibits a convicted felon from being certified as a deputy sheriff.

A former North Carolina sheriff who claimed national notice for tough-on-crime tactics and later admitted to felony crimes is running again.

Multiple media outlets are reporting that Gerald Hege has filed to seek election as Davidson County sheriff.

The Republican resigned as sheriff in 2004 after a decade in office and pleaded guilty to two felony counts of obstruction of justice. Prosecutors say Hege tried to cover up money missing from his department's vice and narcotics unit.

His probation ended in 2007, but he is barred from owning a gun.

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N.C. Senate OKs constitutional proposal on sheriffs

RALEIGH — Voters could decide whether convicted felons should be barred from running for sheriff in North Carolina.

The N.C. Senate voted Wednesday by a 46-1 margin to put a proposed constitutional amendment on the ballot this fall that would prevent anyone convicted of a felony to serve as sheriff.

The N.C. Sheriffs' Association backs the proposed change. Six candidates for sheriff who are known felons ran unsuccessfully during the May 4 primary election, including former Davidson County Sheriff Gerald Hege.

The bill now goes to the N.C. House for consideration.

At least three-fifths of the members in the House and the Senate must approve a proposal for the N.C. Constitution before it can be voted up in a statewide referendum.

Field of candidates for sheriff grows

Expect a contested primary for Lincoln County sheriff this year, at least on the Republican side and possibly on both sides.

Mark Walker of Denver officially announced that he is running this week, which would ensure a primary in a Republican field that already includes David Carpenter.

Among Democrats, Terry Burgin has announced his plans to run and Sheriff Timothy L. Daugherty is planning to seek re-election.

Whether Daugherty is able to defend his office, however, will depend on the outcome of legal proceedings against him. He has been indicted on felony charges of obstruction of justice and will face trial next month. A convicted felon cannot serve as sheriff.

He also faces removal proceedings that could strip him of his office even if he isn't convicted on the criminal charges, but this would not prevent him from returning if he won this year's election.

State and federal investigations of Daugherty's administration are thought to be ongoing and he could potentially face other charges, regardless of the outcome of February's trial and removal hearing and this year's elections.

The newest candidate to make his plans official, Walker is a North Carolina highway patrolman.

"We must win back the public trust in our elected officials," Walker said in a prepared statement. "It is important to know that our elected officials are of the highest integrity and remain above reproach, particularly with regards to law enforcement."

Walker is a 1979 graduate of Gardner-Webb University, where he was captain of the football team. He has served with the Highway Patrol for 26 years, including 14 in Lincoln County. Walker chairs the board of directors of the East Lincoln Fire Department.

Among the candidates who have previously indicated they will run, Carpenter is a probation officer and reserve member of the Lincolnton police. He previously was a lieutenant in the Sheriff's Office under Sheriff Barbara Pickens.

Burgin works for the U.S. Marshal's Service and was previously the Chief of Police in Lincolnton.

Before running for sheriff in 2006, Daugherty was a jailer in Gaston County and had worked in security for Duke Energy. He also served briefly as a Lincolnton reserve police officer under Burgin.

Several other candidates are rumored to be considering a run, possibly from both parties. In addition, there are rumors of other candidates who may not be serious contenders, but who would be

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also-rans in a regional strategy intended to pry away votes from the frontrunners.

Although candidates have continued to announce their plans in recent months, the official filing period for sheriff will be in February.

What some potential candidates might do may depend no the outcome of Daugherty's trial. If the sheriff is removed from office, the Democratic Party executive board would pick a replacement.

That person would have to have filed for sheriff by Feb. 26 in order to seek election in their own right.

RALEIGH – Saying their proposal amounts to common sense, a group of House members are sponsoring a bill aimed at preventing convicted felons from seeking the office of sheriff in North Carolina.

"The thing that makes the sheriff's race different than any other race is that the sheriff has to carry a gun; and a felon cannot lawfully carry a gun," said Rep. Tim Moore, R-Cleveland. "This is one of those bills that just makes common sense."

This year, six convicted felons ran for various sheriff's offices in the state, including David Marrow, who lost a GOP primary in Cleveland County. The others were in Davidson, Washington, Wilkes, Avery and McDowell counties.

Rep. Dan Ingle, a retired police chief in the town of Elon, said North Carolinians were lucky that none of the convicted felon candidates won.

"Our Founding Fathers probably didn't even think that we'd have a felon that would even file for sheriff," said Ingle, an Alamance County Republican.

Ingle noted that it's illegal for a convicted felon to carry a firearm.

"What good is the sheriff going to be if they're out on a call and they cannot carry a firearm?" Ingle asked rhetorically.

The bill would require an amendment to the N.C. Constitution. If approved by the General Assembly, it would be submitted to North Carolina voters for ratification during the Nov. 2 general election.

Such a proposal is supported by the N.C. Sheriff's Association. It mirrors a similar proposal introduced by Sen. Stan Bingham, R-Davidson.

Both bills have broad bipartisan support. Ingle said that the House bill will likely be filed this coming week.

"We want people with good character to hold public office," Ingle said. "A sheriff is the only one that actually has the position where they should be armed. It's the only position that can take away an individual's rights by saying, 'You're under arrest.'"

Gerald Hege, controversial former sheriff of Davidson County, will run again for sheriff next year, his son told FOX8 News.

The earliest Hege could file for the Nov. 2010 election is February, but FOX8 reports that "Vote for Hege" signs already have appeared across the county.

Hege held the office of Davidson County Sheriff for 10 years, beginning in 1994. During his decade as sheriff, Hege's eccentric management style and public persona made him a polarizing figure in the county. The self-proclaimed "America's Toughest Sheriff" had the Davidson County Jail painted pink with crying blue teddy bears, removed all TVs and books — except the Bible — from the jail and reinstated chain gang labor.

Hege, a Vietnam veteran, was also well-known for wearing paramilitary fatigues and driving a sheriff's car painted with silver spiders. One year, he sent out Christmas cards featuring him and the severed head of Osama bin Laden, titled "Happy Ramadan."

In May 2004, Hege pleaded guilty to two felony counts of obstruction of justice for attempting to cover up money missing from the vice and narcotics unit of the sheriff's department. He was removed from office and served three years of probation, which ended in 2007.

Hege was indicted on five counts of embezzlement by a public officer, five counts of obtaining property by false pretenses, two counts of obstruction of justice, one count of endeavoring to intercept oral communication, one count of aiding and abetting to endeavor to intercept oral communication and one count of aiding and abetting to obtain property by false pretenses. As part of his plea bargain, 13 of the 15 charges were dismissed.

Allegations against Hege included that he misappropriated county funds and equipment, ordered prisoner abuse, promoted racial profiling, falsified crime statistics and engaged in speeding and reckless driving in his "spider car."

Current Davidson County Sheriff David Grice, who has held the office since 2004, said that he plans to run for re-election in 2010.

"I will be running next year on the Republican ticket for sheriff in the primary and general elections," Grice said. "I feel like the sheriff's office under my administration has done an excellent job, and we've earned a second term."

He said that Hege's "in-your-face" leadership style was diametrically opposed to his own, which he considers to be more professional.

"We run an honest, professional organization with good management," Grice said. "My interest in being sheriff is what is best for the people of the county, the

victims of crimes and the taxpayers.”

Grice also said that as a convicted felon, Hege cannot own a firearm, but he is allowed to run for public office.

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Hege loss doesn't settle issue: Ban still wanted on felon candidates

Gerald Hege may have lost his bid Tuesday to regain his old job as Davidson County sheriff, but the legal issues he raised with his candidacy remain.

State Sen. Stan Bingham said he will continue to push for a bill that would prohibit convicted felons from becoming sheriffs in North Carolina.

And a citizens group that challenged Hege's candidacy will get a hearing before the Davidson County Board of Elections on Friday.

Incumbent Sheriff David Grice won a decisive victory with 61 percent of the vote in Tuesday's GOP primary.

But Bingham, R-Davidson, said that the issue is too important to let it die with Hege's candidacy.

Bingham proposed the bill last year in anticipation that Hege would run.

Hege's defeat could dampen enthusiasm for the bill, Bingham said.

But he said he would continue to push for the bill, as long as it has the support of the N.C. Sheriff's Association, which voted unanimously in March to back it.

Bingham said that the fact that other convicted felons were running for the sheriff this year in other counties showed that the bill was more than just a Davidson County issue.

Losing their bids for sheriff yesterday were Willie Tharpe in Wilkes County, Robert E. "Nub" Taylor in Avery County and former Sheriff Stanley James in Washington County.

In September 2003, Hege was indicted on 15 felony counts -- five counts of obtaining property by false pretense; five counts of embezzlement by a public officer; two counts of common-law obstruction of justice; and one count each of endeavor to intercept oral communication, aiding and abetting an endeavor to intercept oral communication, and aiding and abetting obtaining property by false pretense.

The charges were the result of a sweeping investigation of the sheriff's office that included affidavits from more than 20 sheriff's officers and staff members. Hege pleaded guilty to two felony counts of obstruction of justice and was removed from office.

He received a suspended sentence and house arrest. After he completed his probation in 2007, he was eligible to file this year to run again for sheriff.

Hege's loss also won't derail a challenge to his candidacy made before the Davidson County elections board last month.

A grass-roots group argued in part that Hege, as a convicted felon, would not be able to carry a gun -- but if elected he would have supervised armed deputies.

The board postponed a decision on the issue until Friday, three days after the primary.

Melisia Prout, one of the group's organizers, said they will continue the challenge even though Hege lost.

She said she would have preferred a decision before the primary, but now that the primary is over and Hege has lost, she wants to continue the challenge in the hopes that Hege would not be able to run again.

"There's always another election in four years," she said. "We want to finish it now so that in four years it won't be an issue again."

Hege did not return a call for comment.

In all, Grice got 9,631 votes to Hege's 3,838, according to complete but unofficial results.

He won all 43 precincts in Davidson County. Of the larger precincts, Hege came close in only one, losing the Gumtree precinct to Grice 164-155. In Tyro, Grice beat Hege by 300 votes. In the Silver Hill precinct, Grice beat Hege by a vote of 490-103.

Once this is done, the felon can simply register and vote."

RALEIGH — Saying their proposal amounts to common sense, a group of House members are sponsoring a bill aimed at preventing convicted felons from seeking the office of sheriff in North Carolina.

"The thing that makes the sheriff's race different than any other race is that the sheriff has to carry a gun; and a felon cannot lawfully carry a gun," said Rep. Tim Moore, R-Cleveland. "This is one of those bills that just makes common sense."

This year, six convicted felons ran for various sheriff's offices in the state, including David Marrow, who lost a GOP primary in Cleveland County. The others were in Davidson, Washington, Wilkes, Avery and McDowell counties.

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"Our Founding Fathers probably didn't even think that we'd have a felon that would even file for sheriff," said Ingle, an Alamance County Republican.

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Both bills have broad bipartisan support. Ingle said that the House bill will likely be filed this coming week.

"We want people with good character to hold public office," Ingle said. "A sheriff is the only one that actually has the position where they should be armed. It's the only position that can take away an individual's rights by saying, 'You're under arrest.'"

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Voters will get chance to bar felons from running for sheriff

Voters in six counties, including Davidson and Wilkes, decided in May that they didn't want former lawbreakers as their sheriffs.

Now in November, voters across North Carolina will get a chance to remove them permanently from the sheriff candidate pool.

The House unanimously agreed yesterday with the Senate's proposed constitutional amendment to prohibit convicted felons from serving as sheriff.

The House will need to approve the language one more time today before it shows up on the Nov. 2 ballot. A majority of voters would have to agree to the amendment before it becomes part of the constitution.

Six known felons ran unsuccessfully for sheriff in the May 4 primary election, including ex-Sheriff Stanley James in Washington County; Gerald Hege, former Davidson County sheriff; and Willie Tharpe of Wilkes County. They all lost.

But they shouldn't have been qualified to run to begin with, said Sen. Stan Bingham, R-Davidson, the bill's chief proponent.

"This shouldn't have to be, especially if you've got a CEO of a large law-enforcement agency," said Bingham, who worked hard to get Hege defeated in May. "It's a little bit different being a felon and getting a job at Hardee's or somewhere else."

The state constitution has few restrictions for people running for elective office. There are minimum ages to serve as governor or in the legislature. Judges, district attorneys and the attorney general must be duly "authorized to practice law in the courts of this state." Convicted felons can run for office -- including sheriff -- once their rights of citizenship are restored, usually when they have completed their punishment.

The N.C. Sheriffs Association has pushed for the restriction on the office, arguing that it is a matter of ethics for a county's top elected law-enforcement officer to follow the law. The association's standards already bar convicted felons from serving as sheriff's deputies.

A convicted felon also is barred from owning a gun, which could put a sheriff at a disadvantage, especially in small departments in which the sheriff is more than an administrator, said Rep. Dan Ingle, R-Alamance, before the bill was tentatively approved in the House by a vote of 112-0.

Although the association isn't aware of any felon ever being elected a sheriff, Edgecombe County Sheriff James Knight, said he believes that the large number of felons who ran last month has helped legislators take up an issue that the association has pushed for years.

"It's sort of hit home and reality set in once they saw the people that were running for sheriff," said Knight, the association's president.

Eddie Caldwell, a lobbyist for the association, said he knew of no opposition to the bill. But at least one of the primary candidates -- David Morrow of Cleveland County -- said that there is no need to change the constitution because voters are already making their feelings known when they cast ballots in the sheriff's races. Morrow has run for sheriff four times, and he received 26 percent of the vote in May's GOP primary.

"That issue is already decided by the people when they vote," said Morrow, who served nine months in prison on what he called a drug-related felony charge of conspiracy. He got out of prison 19 years ago Thursday. He said he was innocent of the charge stemming from \$300 in marijuana that was sold on his property.

Bingham said that the voters will get final say on the issue by way of the amendment.

If the amendment gets on the ballot, it would mark the first constitutional referendum since 2004, when voters narrowly agreed to a change that made it easier for local governments to issue debt for some public building projects.

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

Convicted Felon, Gerald Hege, Says He's Running For Sheriff

Lexington, NC -- The name of a candidate on campaign signs across one part of the Triad is causing a stir.

The race isn't until next year, but signs already have people wondering if a convicted felon is running for sheriff in Davidson County.

WFMY News 2's Mac Ingraham spoke exclusively to the man behind the name.

The state constitution says he can run again.

You may remember Gerald Hege as the "no deals sheriff" -- with the spider patrol car -- the pink jail cells -- and the chain gangs.

The former Davidson County Sheriff pleaded guilty to two counts of obstruction of justice while in office and was removed from the job.

Now, some voters in the county want him back.

Gerald Hege meets with friends most weekday mornings for coffee and conversation.

But six months ago -- Hege says some of those friends started saying he should run again.

Soon after -- they asked for campaign signs.

He gave them some but told them it didn't mean he'd run for sure.

"I'll bring 5 old yard signs and if you guys put them up and if I get five calls the same day then we would be rolling," explained Hege.

The phone messages started pouring in --

"My dad wanted me to tell you he really hopes you run again he thinks you're the best sheriff we've ever had," expressed one caller.

"Those signs don't have a lot of phone numbers on them so for someone to be curious enough to go back look up in the book call me about it I said you know that will get a lot of people talking and we got 21 calls the first night," said Hege.

"I've got a lot of people that wants to vote for you including me," said another caller.

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What started with just a couple of old signs planted the seeds for new signs ... With Hege footing the bill to meet the demand.

"It's a phenomenal thing it really is it blows my mind," Hege exclaimed.

In fact when we were with the former sheriff --- and the spider car he once patrolled in he drew a crowd.

WFMY News 2's Mac Ingraham asked if people are pushing him to run.

"Oh, sure. I mean that's how when people call you that's different from knocking on someone's door and saying I'm running for office how about voting for me," answered Hege. "And people want these signs. First they want one or two then they want 10 or 12. Now we're at almost a 1000 signs. For a politician, that is unheard of. That is a dream come true. That is something that money can't buy for someone to ask you for a sign."

Now Hege did serve house arrest and three years of probation for the two obstruction of justice convictions.

He admits he misses the job of sheriff.

The question is does he have enough support to really get back in office.

It's so unusual that a state senator realized something should be done to keep it from happening.

"Gerald," News 2's Mac Ingraham asked the former sheriff, "we've seen the signs. We've heard the rumors. We're here now to ask you 'Are you running for sheriff in 2010?'"

"Well, I will be a candidate for sheriff in 2010 as a Republican. as a conservative Republican," answered Hege.

It's a far cry from how he left office six years ago after pleaded guilty to those two obstruction of justice charges.

"It wasn't a good day. It wasn't a good day, but you know the laws are made for everyone and I've always been a firm believer you know if you do the crime you do the time."

Hege did his time including 3 year's probation and a 3-month house arrest

He reflects on the 13 other charges dropped by state prosecutors including embezzlement - - obtaining property by false pretenses -- and wire tapping.

"I wouldn't plead guilty to those. - I would go to jail first because it was things I absolutely had nothing to do with," said Hege.

"You don't go after someone for that long to drop 13 charges. There's only one way they drop it they can't win," he added.

So, Hege has been speaking in churches, meeting with supporters, and delivering campaign signs to begin his bid to return to the office of sheriff.

But - - opponents say not so fast.

"I got the petition for removal and I got all the sworn testimony and here it is," State Senator Stan Bingham began.

Bingham wanted a law to prevent felons from running for sheriff.

But he realized - - it would require an amendment to the state constitution which rarely happens.

"That sheriffs are excluded meaning that anyone serving as sheriff can be a felon when they've served their time etc. - even though they can never carry a firearm," he elaborated.

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
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Senator Bingham believes the decision will come down to the voters.

But he says although the state dropped those 13 other charges the voters shouldn't let it go without reading the public case against the sheriff.

"You know if we had no one else to run and this had been one felony count rather than 15 and we had one page of testimony against someone who had a grudge against Gerald but this is 113 pages of testimony 34 officers so for goodness sakes," stated Bingham.

Officers also testified to working on county time to raise money for the former sheriff's non-profit Blue Line Foundation - - and they alleged a misuse of funds by Hege.

"A lot of the officers when you read through this were under the fear of intimidation of losing their jobs," Bingham added.

"My thing is like this you know when you punish the dog it's punishment, but when you beat the dog constantly it's cruelty. And it comes a point in time you've got to stop beating the dog," argued Hege.

Hege brushes off that testimony because he was never convicted of any of it.

But he does agree - - the voters will decide.

"I want to at least be able to lay down at night and say well I gave them a chance to tell me what they want me to do. And once they speak you got to listen. I've listened for three times and that's what I'll do the next time," Hege concluded.

Ingraham asked the former sheriff if he will do things differently if he returns to office.

He said the one major change will be he'll have an attorney - a personal attorney -- sitting across the hallway from him that he'll retain himself.

Right now, as a felon Hege wouldn't be able to carry a gun as sheriff if elected.

Well last month an ex-con challenged that law and the state Supreme Court ruled in favor of him.

Hege - -believes that ruling could allow him to carry a gun if elected sheriff.

As for these court documents we have put them

online below for viewers to look at and make up their own minds.

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Editorial: Wrong office for a felon

Most voters want their sheriff to have broad experience in law enforcement. But what if that experience includes the perspective from behind bars, serving time?

That interesting question has arisen in at least three jurisdictions where convicted felons are running for sheriff. The most high-profile of them involves Davidson County, where former celebrity lawman Gerald Hege is asking voters to return him to the office he was forced to give up when he was indicted on 15 felony counts in 2003. Hege, who ultimately pleaded guilty to two felony counts of obstruction of justice, is among four candidates in the May primary. In Washington County, Stanley James filed to run for sheriff despite a conviction for embezzlement, and in Avery County, candidate Robert Taylor's resume includes a conviction for obstruction of justice and several months in prison.

Once inmates have paid their debt to society, they can petition the courts to get most of their rights restored, including the right to vote and hold elected office. But if voters have reservations about putting a convicted felon in any elective office — and they should have reservations — they ought to be especially dubious of empowering a criminal to guide the county police force. While it might not exactly be the same as letting an inmate run the asylum, it's comes too close for comfort. (It also raises the fascinating question of whether a felon elected sheriff could legally possess firearms, given federal and state restrictions. But that's a debate for another day.)

The N.C. Sheriff's Association is among those who don't like the idea of putting a badge on a former criminal. Its members endorsed a resolution last week saying "it is regrettable that convicted felons have filed to run for election to the Office of Sheriff this year, but the sheriffs have confidence that the public will ensure that no convicted felon is elected as sheriff."

The association also has endorsed a state constitutional amendment, proposed by state Sen. Stan Bingham, that would prohibit felons from serving as sheriff. Although the legislature took no action on the amendment last year, Bingham plans to re-introduce it during this year's short session. It's obviously no coincidence that Bingham is from Davidson County, where Hege's candidacy has stirred strong passions both among his detractors and supporters. Even if the Sheriffs Association and Bingham were initially reacting to one particular candidate, there's still a larger issue — and other candidates — at stake. If a convicted felon isn't allowed to serve as a deputy, what could possibly justify allowing one to be boss of the entire department?

Sheriffs need to have experience with law and order — but it needs to come on the right side of the law.

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

Voters Poised To Judge Sheriffs' Qualifications

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RALEIGH, N.C. -

Voters in six counties decided in May they didn't want former lawbreakers as their sheriffs. Now voters across North Carolina are poised to get a chance this November to remove them permanently from the candidate pool for the centuries-old office.

The House unanimously agreed Wednesday with the Senate's proposed constitutional amendment to prohibit convicted felons from serving as sheriff. The chamber will need to approve the language one more time Thursday before it shows up on the Nov. 2 ballot. A majority of voters would have to agree to the amendment before it's embossed in the constitution.

Six candidates for sheriff who are known felons ran unsuccessfully during the May 4 primary election, including ex-Washington County Sheriff Stanley James and former Davidson County Sheriff Gerald Hege. They all lost. But they shouldn't be qualified to run to begin with, said Sen. Stan Bingham, R-Davidson, the bill's chief proponent.

"This shouldn't have to be, especially if you've got a CEO of a large law enforcement agency," said Bingham, who worked hard to get Hege defeated in May. "It's a little bit different being a felon and getting a job at Hardee's, or somewhere else."

The North Carolina Constitution has few restrictions for people running for elected office. There are minimum ages to serve as governor or in the Legislature. Judges, district attorneys and the attorney general must be duly "authorized to practice law in the courts of this state." Convicted felons can seek office — including sheriff — once their rights of citizenship are restored, usually when they have completed their punishment.

The North Carolina Sheriffs Association has pushed for the restriction on the office, arguing it's a matter of ethics for a county's top elected law enforcement officer to follow the law. The association's standards already bar convicted felons from serving as deputy sheriffs.

A convicted felon also is barred from owning a gun, which could put a sheriff at a disadvantage, especially in small departments where the sheriff is more than an administrator, said Rep. Dan Ingles, R-Alamance, before the bill was tentatively approved in the House by a vote of 112-0.

While the association isn't aware of felon being elected a sheriff, Edgecombe County Sheriff James Knight, said he believes the large number of felons who ran last month has helped lawmakers take up an issue the association has pushed for years.

"It's sort of hit home and reality set in once they saw the people that were running for sheriff," said Knight, the association's president.

Association lobbyist Eddie Caldwell said he knew of no opposition to the bill. But at least one of the primary candidates — David Morrow of Cleveland County — said there's no need to change the constitution because voters are already making their feelings known when they cast ballots in the sheriff's races. Morrow has run for sheriff four times and received 26 percent of the vote in May's Republican primary.

"That issue is already decided by the people when they vote," said Morrow, who served nine months in prison on what he called a drug-related felony conspiracy charge. He got out of prison 19 years ago Thursday. He said he was innocent of the charge stemming from \$300 in marijuana sold on his property.

Bingham said the voters will get to make a final decision on the issue with the amendment.

If the amendment gets on the ballot, it would mark the first constitutional referendum since 2004, when voters narrowly agreed to a change that made it easier for local governments to issue debt for some public building projects.

That this is a problem probably says more about North Carolina than many people want to admit.

State Sen. Stan Bingham said he will push for a bill barring convicted felons from running for sheriff.

In last week's election, four candidates running for sheriff offices were convicted felons and two others were indicted for felonies. None of the candidates won.

If they did, that raises an interesting scenario. Felons are not allowed to carry guns in North Carolina. A sheriff, of course, almost always has one. Sheriffs usually make the determination about concealed weapons permits too. This strange quirk in the law allows a felon to be a sheriff but would prevent the same person from being a deputy.

The only thing odder than allowing felons to run for sheriff is that so many felons actually do run for sheriff in North Carolina.

Maybe there was a concern that there would not be a good pool of candidates to draw from if felons were omitted.

Felons could be kept out of office

LANSING -- Voters may get a voice in former Detroit Mayor Kwame Kilpatrick's future come November.

But it won't be the kind Kilpatrick suggested in 2008, when he pleaded guilty to perjury, resigned his office and said: "Detroit, you done set me up for a comeback."

Under legislation approved unanimously Thursday in the state Senate, voters statewide would be asked to approve a constitutional amendment that would bar any officeholder convicted of a felony involving deceit and fraud from holding public office for 20 years.

Its sponsor, state Sen. Tupac Hunter, D-Detroit, said the ban isn't aimed at the former mayor, former Detroit City Councilwoman Monica Conyers or any individual, but at public corruption.

The proposed ban would apply to any state or local elected official. It mirrors an existing constitutional provision that imposes the 20-year ban on holding office for wayward state legislators.

If approved in the state House by September, the proposal would appear on the ballot Nov. 2.

"I can't imagine there will be a lot of opposition," Hunter said. "It's narrowly constructed to target only activity that involves the public trust. It seems to me it is pretty fair. It's common sense."

The amendment would extend an existing 20-year ban on election to the Legislature for those

convicted of a felony involving a breach of the public trust, broadening it to include all local and state elective office and defining the breach of the public trust to include crimes "involving dishonesty, deceit (and) fraud."

It would not, notably, extend to crimes such as drunken driving or domestic violence.

Abby Rubley, spokeswoman for House Speaker Andy Dillon, said the House will "take a look at it."

To appear on the November ballot, the amendment needs approval by two-thirds majorities in both chambers by Sept. 2.

Hunter said he planned to contact Dillon and other House lawmakers in coming days, and hopes the proposal doesn't become entangled in a dispute over its effect on Kilpatrick or any other individual.

"I believe in my heart this is the right thing to do," Hunter said. "We're all hurt by corruption in government. It's not a particular individual; it's public corruption."

The U.S. Constitution allows a convicted felon to run for Congress, but state law varies greatly. In Texas, a felon would have to get a pardon before

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being allowed to run for office, while in Connecticut, a felon could run after serving the sentence and parole and paying all penalties, according to the Annenberg Public Policy Center in Washington.

Revisions to election eligibility laws are being considered in Louisiana, where a felon would have to get a pardon before running for office, and North Carolina, where felons would be prohibited from running for county sheriff.

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Sheriff candidates discuss views at forum

Four candidates vying for the Davidson County sheriff badge faced off in a forum Tuesday night in Lexington.

The forum was put on by No Deals!, a local nonpartisan group headed up by county resident Oliver Lark.

Doors opened at 6 p.m. for an unofficial meet and greet for sheriff candidates and for county commissioner candidates incumbent Sam Watford and challenger Owen Moore. Register of Deeds David Rickard, who is seeking re-election, also attended the event, as did Republican state House candidates Richard Johnson, for District 80, and Rayne Brown and Fred McClure, for District 81.

Incumbent Davidson County Sheriff David Grice, Republican candidate Terry Price, Republican candidate Edgar Shuler and Democratic candidate Tommy Evans attended and fielded a variety of questions from forum moderator Jerry Holt.

Former Davidson County Sheriff Gerald Hege — also running for the Republican ticket in the May primary — did not attend Tuesday night. Independent sheriff candidate Don Swink attended the event but did not participate in the forum since he will not appear on the primary ballot.

A crowd of about 200 filled the Edward C. Smith Civic Center to listen to what has been a highly discussed election already.

With Hege's plans to run again for the office, controversy has surrounded the upcoming election, enough so that keynote speaker N.C. Sen. Stan Bingham, R-33, called this "one of the most critical races we have ever had in Davidson County."

Candidates weighed in on a question about national and regional publicity and whether that helps or hinders law enforcement efforts; a question which may have stemmed from the media garnered during the Hege administration.

Each candidate expressed his general concern for unnecessary publicity for the sheriff's office but did agree that conducting themselves in a professional manner would lead to positive publicity.

Candidates were at odds over drugs in the county and specifically how to handle the Drug Abuse Resistance Education (D.A.R.E.) program in the county schools.

All candidates agreed on a zero tolerance policy on drugs in schools, but Price and Shuler said once drugs have entered the schools, the problem has reached too far.

"The D.A.R.E. program is a great avenue," said Price. "If we're going to stop drugs, let's not stop them at the lunch line, let's stop them at the county line."

Shuler, a former Davidson County deputy and School Resource Officer favors keeping SRO officers in schools and allowing those officers to mentor students on the dangers of drugs.

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“The SROs need to be certified in the D.A.R.E. program as well,” said Shuler. “Back when I was an SRO, I spoke to every freshman, sophomore, junior and senior class and educated them on drugs.”

Evans said he agrees to be proactive in showing kids the dangers of drugs. A former Thomasville Police Officer, Davidson County Sheriff's Deputy, N.C. Probation and Parole officer and a Division of Motor Vehicle inspector, Evans recalled an incident in his career in which he showed a car that had been seized from a drug dealer to kids.

“You have to educate at a young age,” said Evans. “I remember when I worked as a probation and parole officer, my responsibility was to spend time with these kids. One of the first vehicles seized in this county was actually put on display at a school and kids got a chance to look at it. It showed them (kids) what would happen if they got into drugs. They would lose their assets, they would lose their money, they would lose their freedom.”

Grice said he has been very proactive with drugs in schools and noted that the D.A.R.E. program currently serves 1,500 kids in 17 county schools each year.

“The D.A.R.E. program is a successful program,” said Grice. “It helps kids make wise choices. If you will look in the newspapers on a daily basis, you will see that our officers at the schools, our resource officers are arresting people on this daily, for bringing drugs to school. We've recently started publicizing this. We discussed it and said we need to start publicizing this and maybe these kids will get tired of seeing their names in the paper and quit bringing drugs to school.”

Such publication was criticized by Shuler.

“Here lately, you have only seen it, numerous press releases, weapons, drugs in the school, at the end of this election time,” Shuler said.

The primary election will be held May 4.

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N.C. Sheriffs' Association backs bill preventing felons from holding office

The North Carolina Sheriffs' Association voted Wednesday to back Senate Bill 351, a proposed state constitution amendment put to voters that would keep convicted felons from serving as sheriff.

The bill, introduced last spring by state Sen. Stan Bingham, R-Davidson, never died and has been referred to the Ways & Means committee.

"The North Carolina Sheriffs' Association does not want something as crucial and fundamental to professional law enforcement as the public trust to be placed in the hands of a known felon, having been found to be such in a court of law," said the association in a news release.

No current law is in place keeping a convicted felon from holding the office. If the bill is passed by the General Assembly in the upcoming session it would still require a state constitutional amendment — proposed in the bill as a referendum to be placed on the November general election ballot — to go into effect.

Davidson is one of six counties that has a convicted felon on the May primary ballot for sheriff. The other counties are Cleveland, Avery, McDowell, Washington and Wilkes.

Former Davidson County sheriff and convicted felon Gerald Hege is seeking re-election to the office he left in 2004 after he plead guilty to two counts of felony obstruction of justice.

Hege questioned the timing from the Senate to address a bill that wants to keep candidates in his situation out of office.

"This is the same they did last year, the sheriffs' association," said Hege. "This is really nothing new, getting closer to the primary I guess they're trying to get some press."


Hege also pointed out Bingham's public endorsement for incumbent Davidson County Sheriff David Grice.

"The sheriff is his neighbor and friend and they are seeing all these 4,000 yard signs out here and they're in a panic," said Hege.

Grice, on the other hand, said the reason the association is reviewing the bill is because of general concern by the public.

"I think it's a good idea," said Grice. "And I think the sheriffs' association made a wise move in letting the public and the taxpayers of North Carolina know that they take a stand and oppose this. I feel if you are in the position of sheriff, you should lead by example."

Bingham said he is more hopeful his bill can be passed with the added support from



the association.

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"I'm happy about this," said Bingham. "Now with their support, that will make a great difference. This will help a lot, it will make it easier."

Hege added he feels as though he is being targeted specifically by the bill.

"People make mistakes," said Hege. "That's why the constitution is set up the way it is. You make a mistake, you pay your debt back to society and then you get on with your life. That's why the primary process is the way it is; people can eliminate any unwanted candidate."

Hege originally faced 15 felony charges before taking a plea bargain that resulted in two felony obstruction of justice charges. He served three years of intensive probation.

Given his record, Hege could not return to the sheriff's department as a deputy officer. Bingham said it's too much of a risk to allow felons to hold the highest law enforcement position in the county.

Grice also addressed that law and said, "I think people expect the chief law enforcement officer, the sheriff, to conform to the same basic standards an entry-level deputy must meet."

Grice said an entry-level deputy cannot be hired with a conviction of a class B misdemeanor, much less a felony.

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GOP supports no felons as sheriff bill

Local candidates speak on issues

Thursday night at the Davidson County Courthouse, the county Republican Convention was asked if felons should be able to run for the office of sheriff.

The party's answer was emphatic: No.

Party chairman Lance Barrett welcomed delegates, candidates and guests. After concluding most of the meeting's business, Barrett asked the crowd to turn its attention to a resolution supporting a bill introduced by state Sen. Stan Bingham, R-33, that would bar felons from running for the office of sheriff. The resolution was passed with only a small group voting against.

Barrett then invited Republican candidates from all local contested races to speak briefly. The recent passage of health care reform and higher taxes were the focus of comments by national and state candidates, but economic woes were discussed by all local candidates.

Incumbent Davidson County Commissioner Sam Watford touched on projects he supported in the past, and promised the same dedication to the job in the future if re-elected.

"Local government cannot be all things to all people," Watford said. "Ours is a complex world and there are no simple fixes or simplistic solutions. But when the polls close, I will continue serving the Lord, my family and, if enough people have confidence in me, Davidson County."

Fellow incumbent Commissioner Don Truell pointed to schools built or remodeled, new sewer lines constructed, an addition to the Denton Library, fundamentals constructed for a county public transportation system, economic development incentives given to prospective businesses and other accomplishments made over the last eight years.

"But we did all these things, and what I'm more proud of, is that with the seven people on the board, we did all this without an increase in the tax rate," Truell said.

County commissioner candidate Eric Osborne's message was brief.

"I came up here to talk about taxes, tax breaks, relinquishing pay, but I'm not going to do it because, the way I look at it, the party's already gone to who they want us to vote for, so I won't waste anyone else's time," he said.

Owen Moore, also running for commissioner, told the crowd he was proud to be a



third generation conservative Republican. If elected, he promised to be a listener and a learner as the county found new ways to revive prosperity.

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"One of the main things I will be interested in is, like they say in real estate: 'location, location, location.' Only on this, it will be 'jobs, jobs, jobs,'" Moore said. "The people whose jobs went away, we need to get them employed. That will help everything."

Billy Joe Kepley first came to the board of commissioners in 1990. Unlike most candidates' top issues of law enforcement, school performance and economic development, Kepley explained there are professional staff looking after the daily duties of each. The commissioner's job was to develop new, innovative ways to guide that staff and move the county in the future.

"One of the things I've pushed for is small businesses," Kepley said. "They have been somewhat ignored, so I've pushed for something we can do for small businesses. When large industries move overseas, they take jobs with them. That doesn't happen with smaller companies."

Eddie Gallimore, running for a seat on the county board, has been vice chairman of the Davidson County Republican Party for the past year. He supports the right to bear arms, is a graduate of Central Davidson High School and owns a construction and grading business.

"Jobs are something that we need," Gallimore said. "I know. I have spent a lot of time with friends that are not working. We need to do whatever it takes within reason. We don't want to go and spend a lot of money like some of the counties to have a building sitting empty because somebody is coming in and doing great things for us and then they up and pull out on us."

Kenneth "Stump" Cavender told the assembly he spent 30 years in industrial management and currently owns a small business. He said frankly he does not feel represented by the current county board, and decided to run to "move the commissioners a little more to the right."

"I feel that if I'm elected commissioner I'm going to work very hard for a lot of the small companies in Davidson County because that's where the growth is going to be in Davidson County," Cavender said.

Commissioner candidate Dwight Cornelison spoke about experience gained during his eight years on the Thomasville City Council. Like the other candidates, he cited jobs and the economy as the top issues of this election, calling for a freeze in all construction and capital spending for the next two years. Cornelison also mentioned intent to press the General Assembly to put a definition of marriage before North Carolina voters.

"We can talk jobs, we can talk taxes, we can talk everything we want, but without a strong family unit, we will not have a strong community and we will not have a strong economy," Cornelison said.

Larry Allen, former commissioner running to get his seat back on the county board, criticized the current board for accepting ownership of the Wil-Cox Bridge. He talked about his conservative voting record while on the board and promised, if elected, he would spur the county to work harder to recruit business.

"We have to let the world know that Davidson County is open for business," Allen said.

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Supporters of Hege should accept defeat

The voters have spoken. The Davidson County Board of Elections has spoken. State law has spoken. Gerald Hege, who resigned as sheriff six years ago after pleading guilty to two felonies, and his supporters need to accept all this and move on and give up any dreams of him returning to the office of sheriff.

Hege's defeat in the Republican primary Tuesday night should have been the end of his political ambitions for this year. But the board of elections still held a previously scheduled hearing Friday to deal with petitions questioning Hege's candidacy. The board made the only decision it could - to dismiss the petitions, since Hege lost. Unfortunately, supporters and opponents of Hege then scuffled in the parking lot after the hearing.

On a related note, State Sen. Stan Bingham, R-Davidson, should continue to push his legislation to ban felons from running for sheriff to prevent such a scenario from occurring in the future. Four felons ran for office this year, but voters wisely rejected all. The fact a felon can run for a county's top law enforcement position and be in position to enforce laws he may have broken simply boggles the mind.

Anyone who lives in Lexington or uses city utilities won't be happy to see fee increases in the coming fiscal year. The increases will come out to about \$100 for a city household, slightly less for utilities customers who live in the county and don't use city garbage collection. The increases come as a result of fewer manufacturers to pay taxes, which leaves council members looking elsewhere for ways to make up the lost revenue. Increases are especially difficult during challenging economic times. City leaders vow they're cutting expenses to keep the increases as low as possible, and this must remain a priority, which could produce some tough decisions about services.

Students in the Lexington City Schools probably aren't too happy this week, either. The board of education approved longer school days for the coming year. Fifteen minutes is not very long, but the key will be for teachers and students to use that time wisely to increase learning. High school students will have an additional period for enrichment-type courses while middle school students will focus on literacy.
